Great Plains SPCA Offers Support During Extreme Heat

Merriam, K.S. — As temperatures rapidly are rising this summer, Great Plains SPCA is urging pet owners to take critical precautions to protect animals from extreme heat. High temperatures can quickly lead to heat exhaustion, heatstroke, and even death, especially for pets left outdoors without adequate shade or water.

“The heat can become deadly very quickly,” said Tam Singer, CEO of Great Plains SPCA. “Our pets rely on us to keep them safe. That means keeping them cool, hydrated, and indoors during the hottest parts of the day.”

Great Plains SPCA’s Recommendations for Pet Owners During Extreme Heat:

- Bring Pets Indoors – Keep animals inside during the heat of the day. Ensure they have access to fans or air conditioning.
- Never Leave Pets in a Parked Car – Even with the windows cracked, the temperature inside a car can become deadly within minutes.
- Limit Outdoor Activity – Walk pets early in the morning or after sunset. Pavement can burn paw pads.
- Provide Ample Fresh Water and Shade – Ensure pets have continuous access to clean water and shaded areas if outside briefly.
- Watch for Signs of Heatstroke – Heavy panting, drooling, vomiting, lethargy, and collapse are signs of heat distress. Seek veterinary care immediately.

For pet owners with outdoor-only pets, Great Plains SPCA is providing free *Bring Your Pet Inside Kits* with essential supplies to assist pet owners in bringing their animals out of the extreme heat. These kits are only intended for outdoor pets, especially those who are regularly chained or tethered, and include items to support safe, indoor care.

If you see an animal in distress due to the heat, do not hesitate: contact your local animal control immediately.

Additionally, the organization is distributing kiddie pools to current HERO clients to help outdoor pets stay cool and hydrated.

“Keeping pets safe is our number one priority,” Singer added. “Heat related complications for pets are preventable with simple precautions, and we are happy to support our community.”
